## From the Pastor's Desk

The End Product. The end of a story is very important. Hollywood puts a lot of time and effort and research into the end of a movie. The "right" ending can either make or break the box office success of a production. Although Hollywood can re-write an ending pleasing to the public the most meaningful and memorable dramas and stories have endings that speak a truth to us.

Today the Gospel story ends in a particular way, but one that would not be satisfying to Hollywood. The story does not end centered around one of the main characters as is most appealing in the movies. The woman who encounters Jesus at the well, who plays such a significant part in the story, just seems to fade into the crowd. Why?

The end of the story is concerned with one thing. The villagers say it well: "We no longer believe because of your word, for we have heard for ourselves, and we know that this is truly the savior of the world." The woman at the well has a purpose; a purpose bigger than herself and yet absolutely essential to her very own salvation.

The ending given points out to me my ultimate purpose. My purpose in coming to know Jesus more intimately is to tell others about Him so they can believe. I cannot do this unless I am willing to encounter Jesus, to ask Him questions and to be ready to hear His answers, even when they cut to the quick. Like, when Jesus lets the woman know that she has had several husbands and now is living with another; she doesn't turn away in anger, she is further intrigued because Jesus speaks the truth, even though it's not a pretty truth.



So I must be open to Jesus showing me the not-so-pretty truths about my attitudes and/or behaviors. Jesus loves this woman and so He cannot allow her to continue in the untruths she exhibits, like about where to worship, or whose water it really is that truly quenches thirst, or about her failed relationships. The truth sets her free; it is not easy but it does free her to bring others to Jesus.

We often want to write our own ending to the story; one that downplays or ignores the truths about our unwillingness to trust, to see our sins or to recognize our stubbornness. This is what society tells us is "our right." Perhaps "our right" is not right for it leaves little room for Truth. Truth is not a Hollywood commodity to be manipulated into 50 shades of grey. It is found in God's Word, in the person of Jesus, and we see it at work in this Gospel today.

Openness to God's truth, the Truth, is the only way to lasting happiness. This is a central lesson to this poignant story. The woman fulfills her true ultimate purpose when she learns the Truth. She sees the Christ. She, who was once scorned and avoided by her neighbors, is now energized by the Truth she encountered at the well. With this she now teaches them, commands their attention, and they listen and they also come to believe.

If we are so concerned about the end product, this is it: listening and seeking God's Truth, which both challenges you and me and brings consolation but leads us to deeper belief and, so also, to mission. The mission is to tell others about the Truth Jesus gives that satisfies our thirst and sets us really free. We do this by our actions which demonstrate an increase in our trust that this is the Savior of the world. You and I begin to live out of that reality and when we do others are attracted too.

## Our Lenten Parish Activity

During Lent, there are three words that come to mind: Prayer, Offering, and Sacrifice. These words remind us of what Jesus did for us. Would you like to become more like Christ? Set a goal and see how many deeds you can do. As you come to Mass each week, please take a ribbon corresponding to your Lenten deed and tie it to the cross. Here are some examples for you to consider:

**Prayer** --attend Stations of the Cross, Eucharistic Adoration or daily Mass, take time to read the Bible, pray for family or special intentions, pray the rosary, visit church.

**Offering-**-donate money, food or other needed items to a charitable organization, participate in Operation Rice Bowl, give your time and talent to someone or group in need.

**Sacrifice-**-give up sweets, that special cup of coffee, television, texting, computer games or time, gossiping, etc. Sacrifices can also be that one thing you don't want to do but should.



#### What Does Lent Have to Do with Those Becoming Catholic?

In Lent, some RCIA participants move into the final period of preparation for the sacraments. They have been nourished by the graces of various liturgical Rites throughout the RCIA process, which have helped them to embrace God's call. Today, our *Elect*, *Mariano Vlcek*, will celebrate the First Scrutiny with the parish. This Rite will help deliver him from the power of sin and Satan, protect him against temptation and give him strength in Christ, who is the Way, the Truth, and the Life.

The Rites of Scrutiny are meant to uncover and then heal all that is weak, defective or sinful in the heart of the *Elect* as well as remind the whole parish community of the need to reflect on their own sins and the need for God's help.



# **Need Assistance with Tuition?**

Diocese of Gary tuition assistance applications for the 2018/19 school year are now available. The applications are only online at the Diocesan website, www.dcgary.org. You will find the application by clicking on the Schools tab and then clicking on the blue rectangle labeled Tuition Assistance Application. There are no paper applications. The regular application period will close on March 19, 2018. After that date, families must wait for initial awards to be distributed before the application will open again sometime in June for late applications, appeals, and new families. **Tuition assistance is only open to Catholic** families who are registered members of parishes within the Diocese of Gary. You may complete an application if you have children entering grades kindergarten through twelve. Pre-school students are not eligible for tuition assistance. There is a \$27 fee per family to apply. If you need help with the application, FACTS will have an e-mail address, phone number, and chat line on the application website for customer service.

## **Bringing Home the Gold**

On Saturday, February 17th, the SMS 7th and 8th grade Science Olympiad team participated in the Regional Competition at Indiana University Northwest. We had a total of 21 students compete that weekend. This is an event that has many science related activities from anatomy to zoology. Two of our groups medaled in their specific event. Maggie Keith and Brianna Cook won 5th place in the Potions and Poisons event that was based on concepts in

chemistry. Nathan Anderson and Gabriel Novales won 1st place for Roller Coasters. ## Getting to Know THE GOOD SAMARITANS Part I

Longtime parishioners, Dottie and Elmer Doctor, organized the St. Vincent DePaul Society Ministry, now known as the Good Samaritans Ministry, at St. Michael Parish in the early 1980's, when Fr. Joseph Vamos was pastor. Dottie, who worked with the St. John Township office in assisting people in need through the Community Center, felt a ministry at St. Michael's could work together with the Township. After attending meetings at St. Mary's Parish in Griffith and familiarizing herself with the focus of this ministry, she organized the St. Vincent DePaul Society along with approximately six members from our parish. In the early years, this small group of dedicated members, delivered food to families in need, did minor repairs for parishioners and helped move furnishings to Sojourner Truth House. They also hosted the Baby Jesus birthday party which provided baby items for those in need. Today we have two ministries, the Respect Life Ministry and the Rebuilding Hope Mission Team who now provide those services. In the early to mid 2000's, our ministry was renamed The Good Samaritans, due to changes in the National Standards and Rules of the St. Vincent DePaul Society. Today our ministry has sixteen members and we are honored to have one of the original members, Richard Cox, in our present group.

From the Past Through the Present to the Future





Please remove all the decorations that you wish to keep from your cemetery grave sites so that St. Michael's maintenance crew can start clean-up as soon as possible (weather permitting). Eternal lights & attached vases can remain. If there are any Christmas decorations that remain and seem in good condition, are artificial, and have not blown off the grave sites they will be left on the south side of the storage shed on the east side of the cemetery. Everything else will be disposed of and the Decorating Rules & Regulations, (available at most entrances to the cemetery) will be strictly followed after the clean-up is finished. It is hoped that the cemetery will be ready for Easter decorations. The saved items will be kept through April 9th and then disposed.


